Objectifs:

This course aims to give a broad introduction to English phonetics and phonology, taking into account geographical and social contexts as well as recent developments. The course will help students who need it to improve their English pronunciation. It will also provide a descriptive and practical background to the sounds and accents of English for those who go on to teach.

Contenu:

The course covers theoretical aspects of speech production, and explores the phonological system of English, including suprasegmental phenomena such as rhythm and intonation. Phonemic transcription is practised, and accents of English are studied in the context of English as a world language.

Forme de l'évaluation:

A 2-hour written test in class at the end of the course (100%), plus assignments and phonemic transcriptions (requirement for continuous assessment). Rattrapage by a 2-hour written test at the time of the following FLSH exam session (100%) (only possible if the regular end-of-course test has already been attempted) plus assignments and phonemic transcriptions (requirement for continuous assessment).
