## Objectifs:

The objective of the course is to introduce and examine a range of revenge tragedies from the period 1590-1615.

On completion of the course the student will be expected to be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a clear understanding of the nature of Renaissance revenge drama
- 2. Discuss revenge tragedy from several perspectives such as gender, religion, law and the history of revenge
- 3. Demonstrate an ability to make arguments about these themes, orally in the seminars and presentation, and in writing in the essay

## Forme de l'évaluation:

Students will be expected to participate actively in seminars. Therefore you will be graded 5% for seminar oral participation. 20% will be for a group presentation; 75% for the essay 1600-2000 words. One re-write of the essay will be permitted Note: Failure to hand in a written assignment in the accorded time, without an acceptable reason, will automatically result in a fail.
