Objectifs:

The aim of this course is to introduce students to some of the most popular and controversial Victorian novels. We will examine how these novels acquired the status they now have and why we still read them today. We will study the reception and the consumption of these novels, as well as their material production: how did the Victorians read these novels? What did they say about them? What were these authors trying to achieve? Students will explore the history of the novel, challenging their idea of what is literature.

The seminar will combine close reading with careful contextualisation of these works. Building on the first-year introduction to critical theory, we will use a range of critical approaches.

Thomas Hardy, Tess of the D'Urbervilles (1892)

Oscar Wilde, The Picture of Dorian Gray (1890)
