Objectifs:

The primary aim of this course is to 1) develop theoretical links between socio-cultural and psychological perspectives on human mobility and 2) equip students with training in collecting and analyzing empirical data.

Contenu:

As humans move, they encounter different cultural worlds. In the scaled-up context of globalization, there remains a call for more micro-level studies to better understand people's experiences and the psychological phenomena involved in migration and mobility. In order to fill this gap and to highlight various theoretical links between socio-cultural and psychological perspectives on human mobility, this course invites students to read and reflect on diverse and specific topics relating to mobility from a socio-cultural perspective in psychology, and to engage in fieldwork research through collecting and analyzing empirical data.

Forme de l'évaluation:

During the course, students will be assessed in three ways:

- 1) Reading and participation. Students are expected to complete all the assigned readings and to be prepared to discuss them.
- 2) An oral presentation of the data collection and analysis. The presentation will be done individually or in groups depending on the numbers of participants.
- 3) Students are expected to produce a short report of the fieldwork by the end of the course (3 pages) in English.

Documentation:

Texts will be available for the students at the beginning of the term.

Pré-requis:

This course is open to all Bachelor students.

Forme de l'enseignement:

This course is a combination of reading and discussing texts and fieldwork (collecting data through interviews and other methods and analyzing them in class) and it is taught in English.
