Objectifs

This course aims at:

- 1) developing theoretical links between human mobility and family life and,
- 2) equipping students with training in collecting and analyzing empirical data.

Contenu

In times of increased geographical mobility, more micro-level studies are needed to better understand the psychological phenomena involved in migration and mobility and how family life affects the international adjustments of migrants. This course invites students to read and reflect on diverse topics relating to human mobility from a sociocultural perspective in psychology and to engage in fieldwork research through collecting and analyzing empirical data. The course further explores conceptual and applied issues around the relationship between human mobility and family life.

Forme de l'évaluation

During the course, students will be assessed in the following ways:

- 1) Reading and class participation: Students are expected to complete all the assigned readings and to be prepared to discuss them. During the course, students will be engaged in group exercises and class discussions about fieldwork.
- 2) Final work: Students are expected to write a paper (3-5 pages) in English at the end of the course.
