Objectifs

At the end of the course, the student is able to identify the international scope of a collective action problem, the sources of market failure, the nature of the public good, the type of aggregation technology and the form of strategic interaction between core players. She/he is at ease to screen the relevant information in order to evaluate, for a particular issue (health, security, the environment,...) which source of inefficiency is more acute and which type of remedy is most needed.

Contenu

The course is subdivided into two parts. The first part provides the basic analytical tools, including a taxonomy of the types of global public goods, a review of elementary game theory and a discussion of the basic financing principles of public services in an international context. The second part is devoted to the application of these analytical instruments to specific domains, such as global health, international security and global environmental problems.
