Contenu

This course provides students with an introduction to the major areas of study of Pragmatics. Pragmatics is the systematic study of how people understand and communicate beyond the literal meaning of words and sentences used in communication. Therefore, Pragmatics is interested in the context of communication and how this works in different types of social interaction.

For example, Pragmatics allows us to answer the following questions:

- Why do sentences such as, "It's dark in here" sometimes mean different things such as "Turn on the lights" or "It's creepy in here"?
- Why is it offensive to use swear words in some situations, while in other cases it is a sign of being close?
- How do we manage to understand each other when we often do not explicitly say what we mean?

In this seminar, we will address these and many other questions. We will read and discuss a selection of influential studies in this field concerning topics such as speech act theory, deictics, (im)politeness and pragmatic markers, just to name a few. In the second part of this seminar, students will get hands-on experience by applying some of these tools and methods to their own small-scale research projects using corpus or self-collected data.

Forme de l'évaluation

Regular participation is required (10%). The rest of the semester grade comes from two assignments. The first assignment (30%) is a group project based on a pragmatics topic of their choosing. Each group will present the results of their project during the final weeks of term. The final 60% comes from an individual term paper (approx. 10 pages), which will be an expansion of the group project. A minimum of 4.0 is required to pass this course.

If a final grade of a 4.0 is not reached, it will lead to a rattrapage of an additional and longer (approx. 20 page) paper on a new subject. The subject of the rattrapage paper must be approved by the instructor.

Pré-requis

Students must have taken an introductory linguistics class. As this course is given in English, a minimum of a B2 level is required.
