Contenu

As Morgan Lloyd Malcolm's Emilia says, 'We are only as powerful as the stories we tell' (Lloyd Malcolm, 2019). However, who gets to tell their story is another question.

Taking Lloyd Malcolm's 2018 play Emilia as our core text we will consider the early modern writers she portrays on stage: Emilia Bassano (Lanyer/Lanier), Mary Sydney, and Shakespeare's Dark Lady Sonnets. This contemporary British play was first staged at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre in London in 2018 and offers a historically fictionalised account of the life of Emilia Bassano (1569 -1645).

Emilia Bassano was one of the first women to publish poetry, publishing her volume of proto-feminist poetry Salve Deus Rex Judaeorum in 1611. However, her place in the literary canon has been somewhat overshadowed by claims she was Shakespeare's muse and the so-called 'Dark Lady' of Shakespeare's Sonnets.

In 2018, Lloyd Malcolm's protagonist became every woman, embodying their collective anger, and social media responded. Emilia was established as essential viewing, working as a manifesto for a feminist revolution. The act of writing back across textual boundaries functioned as historical recuperation, placing the textual memories of the real Emilia Bassano into the bodies of modern women. Lloyd Malcolm's Emilia was written within the maelstrom of the Me Too movement, a reaction to allegations of sexual assault by Hollywood producer Harvey Weinstein and others which saw women who had been subjected to sexual harassment or assault telling their stories using the hashtag '#MeToo'. It also appeared in the wake of the 2017 Women's Marches that took place worldwide following Donald Trump's inauguration as President of the United States. It is from within this fourth-wave feminist movement that we will address our texts.

Emilia notes that:

We hear the echoes bounding down the passage of time and into our dreams. We read what was recorded and we see what is missing. We see what they did not want us to write down (Lloyd Malcolm, 2019).

Analysing early modern poetry in conversation with predominately fourth-wave feminist essays of Rebecca Solnit (the originator of the concept of 'mansplaining'), Audre Lorde, bell hooks, and others, this course will ask: what happens when early modern women talk back, and we place early modern female poets back into the narrative?
