Contenu

This seminar will introduce students to the work of Virginia Woolf (1882-1941), one of the most iconic modernist English writers, whose literary career flourished in the context of significant cultural and historical change in early twentieth-century Britain. Woolf's engagement with modernity and the imperative of 'making it new' yielded works of startling originality, which explore questions as varied as the nature of subjectivity and the human mind, gender and patriarchy, the idiom of modernist fiction, or the city as the locus of modern experience. We will consider these questions in a number of key texts, including extracts from the earlier fiction, her best-known novels Mrs. Dalloway and To the Lighthouse, a selection of short stories and essays – among which the famous feminist polemic A Room of One's Own – as well as excerpts from her autobiographical writings.
