Contenu

During the Covid-19 pandemic, it is particularly interesting to look to the (medieval) past to obtain possible answers as to how people reacted to the spread of highly contagious diseases in former days. While it was difficult for humans to control the Black Death, a 14th-century pandemic that killed up to 60 percent of the population, its aftermath led to a series of social changes. Continental writers such as Giovanni Boccaccio and Guillaume de Machaut explicitly tackle the plague and its consequences in their works. English authors, however, are more reticent about the disease, mostly addressing its repercussions in an indirect way only. In this seminar, we will read a choice of literary texts that deal with the plague (directly and indirectly) or with lepra, a generic term for a disease that may be associated with the plague. We will extend our discussion to literature on other illnesses such as lovesickness or physical impairment. Finally, and as the term disease suggests, we will turn to texts that address forms of uneasiness which are triggered by social or religious transgressions.
