Contenu

This reading-intensive course is an introduction to British fiction after 1945, focusing on five major works set in and around London that are interested in the complexity of human relationships and the impact of public events on the private self. We will discuss how setting, but also style, character, dialogue, and point of view are used to address some of the main issues in British politics, society, and culture since WWII, including, among other themes, the Cold War, counterculture, Thatcher, immigration, sexuality, religion, class, music, AIDS, and the function of art.

Forme de l'évaluation

Either 1. two shorter essays (4-6 double-spaced pages each), 2. one long essay (10-12 pages), or 3. a reading journal and one shorter essay.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The aims of this course are the following:

- To develop students' close reading skills, learned in the first-year Introduction to Literature course.
- To pursue in more depth a specific genre, period, or theme in modern literary history.
- To improve expository and critical writing skills, notably through class participation and through critical essays.
- To improve research-paper writing skills, notably by learning how to integrate secondary criticism into the essay.
- To learn about British history and culture.
