Objectifs:

In this course, we will discuss

- how spontaneous conversations can be analyzed
- what conventions speakers observe when they strike up a conversation, tell stories, repair an utterance, or end a conversation
- how a research project in conversation analysis is carried out
- how conversational data can be gathered and transcribed

Contenu:

Engaging in spontaneous conversation is one of the most natural behaviors of human beings. But how do conversations actually work? What are the rules and conventions that speakers follow when they hold a conversation? Before the 1960s, it was assumed that conversations are unstructured and chaotic. Since then, a large body of research has shown that conversations are in fact systematically structured. We are going to discuss how speakers strike up a conversation, how they react to each other's utterances, how they tell stories, and how they end a conversation. Issues such as turn-taking, repair, and the sequential organization of conversation will inform our discussions.
