Contenu

Students will have the opportunity to engage with the following Shakespeare plays in performance and print: As You Like It, Hamlet, Macbeth and Titus Andronicus. We will analyse representations of race, gender, violence, sexual violence, politics, court versus country life, and justice and injustice. We will also consider key comic scenes (but not the entire play) of Henry IV, Part I. Students will be given a comprehensive introduction to each play before we begin to analyse its performance history and landmark productions and adaptations. They will be introduced to performance criticism and to different theoretical approaches to adaptation studies.
