Contenu

"Europe is not only a museum, it is the habitat of people who have known more violence, more life than we have." Patricia Highsmith's journal entry of 31 March 1954 partly explains why so many of America's most iconic writers, including members of the so-called Lost Generation, lived expatriate lives and set their works in Europe. Whether drawn by adventure, cheaper living, or greater artistic, political or sexual freedom, they developed a mythical literary landscape, from Shakespeare and Sons in Paris to the running of the bulls in Pamplona, that continues to fascinate readers and draw thousands of visitors.

In the wake of Henry James, many of their texts focus on the cultural differences between the Old and the New World, or what the Master called the "International Theme." In this seminar, we will explore how two generations of mid-twentieth century writers imagined the relation between the United States and Europe. What did they find in France, Italy, or Spain that they could not find back home? How did their tales of love, art, crime, or adventure express their nation's deepest fears and anxieties? And did they continue to see the US as standing for innocence, Europe for knowledge? We'll end the course by asking if Americans are still interested in Europe today, and whether their overly essentializing national types remain operative.
